CACTI AND OTHER SUCCULENTS OF THE MONTH —

Oldest Owned Plant

One of the first questions asked when we show a beautiful specimen is "How long have you had that plant?" While we often don't know exactly how old a plant is, we have a pretty good idea how long we have owned and nurtured it.

Some plants grow very large as they age and become unwieldy and difficult to move, but some stay small and even at ten, twenty, and even thirty years old they make great show entries. Growing a plant to great age and keeping alive is an accomplishment, keeping that same plant looking good enough to enter into a show is amazing.

Look for some spectacular specimens in the upcoming Inter-City Show.

The 2011 Inter-City Show

The 2011 Inter-City Show is just around the corner. The show is August 13-14, 9 – 5. Set-up starts Wednesday morning and runs to the start of judging Friday evening. This is the largest and most well known show in the country, with entrants from Southern California and all the adjacent states. We routinely get visitors from Japan, India and Korea, as well as many of the countries in Europe. This year we have one entrant driving from Alabama, just to enter plants. As always this promises to be an extraordinary show.

It's only an extraordinary show if we have a great selection of plants in all classes, from novice through open. Everyone in the advanced and open category started as a novice, so don't be afraid to bring your best plants. Your plants are probably better than you think, but you will never really know until you bring

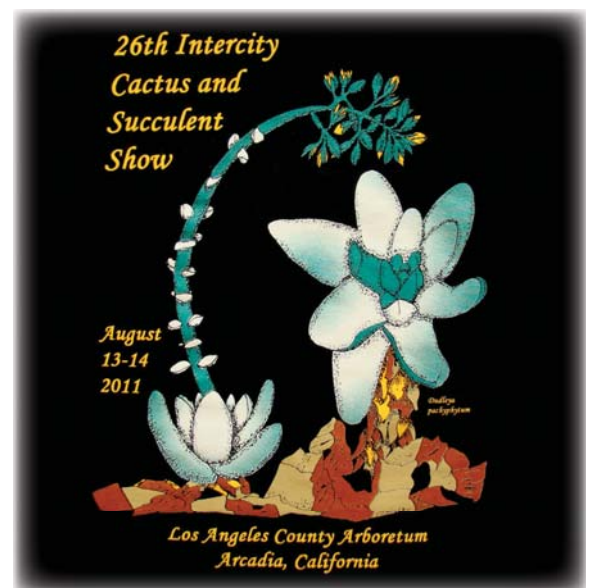
them to a show and enter them to be judged. You learn an enormous amount by bring even a few plants, and entering will make you a better grower. It gives you an opportunity to meet and talk to people with similar experience and compare notes on what works and what doesn't.

There will be entry tags and helpers at the show. If you are new to showing plants, just bring the plants to the show room in Ayres Hall. We will help you name and place the plants.

Please come to the show and sale. There is an advance sale on Friday for entrants and volunteers. There will be thousands of plants for sale, many of which appear only at this show. Be sure to come Saturday and Sunday to see the show, see your plants, and visit the sales area. Bring your friends as well. The Inter-City show is the largest source of new members for all the participating clubs.

This show is run entirely by volunteers, and we are always in need of help, particularly during set-up on Wednesday morning and during the sales rush on Saturday. Please contact Tom Glavich at tglavich@sbcglobal.net or 626-798-2430 if you would like to volunteer, or just show up. Show participants and volunteers can enter for free at the Ayres gate. Please wear your club badge. This show is one of the biggest money makers of the year for all three of the Inter-City clubs, and pays for much of the room rental and some of the speaker costs for the rest of the year.

This should be a great show, please bring your plants to make it a memorable one, and please come and see it.



Book Review

Aloes, The Definitive Guide

S. Carter, J. Lavranos, L. Newton, and C. Walker

Published by Kew Royal Botanic Gardens and the British Cactus and Succulent Society

720 pages \$160

This book was just published in May and is the first time that all known Aloe species have been included in a single volume. It builds upon Reynolds' 1950 Aloes of South Africa and 1960 Aloes of Tropical Africa and Madagascar. Combined, those books described 330 species. The Definitive Guide updates this to 519 species and a total of 561 taxa through 2008 and adds four pages of addenda just prior to publication.

The book is very user friendly and certainly has the hobbyist in mind. The layout is very similar to the Guide to the Aloes of South Africa by Van Wyk and Smith and even groups them similarly. Van Wyk and Smith arrange them in ten groups by growth habit starting with tree Aloes and ending with grass Aloes. Carter, et al., also have ten groups starting with grass Aloes and ending with tree Aloes.

In the short, interesting 15 page introduction I learned new things such as each flower is open for two days and several species are poisonous and human deaths have resulted from ingestion. A 75 page history of Aloe exploration and discovery is thorough and gives life to epithetic names.

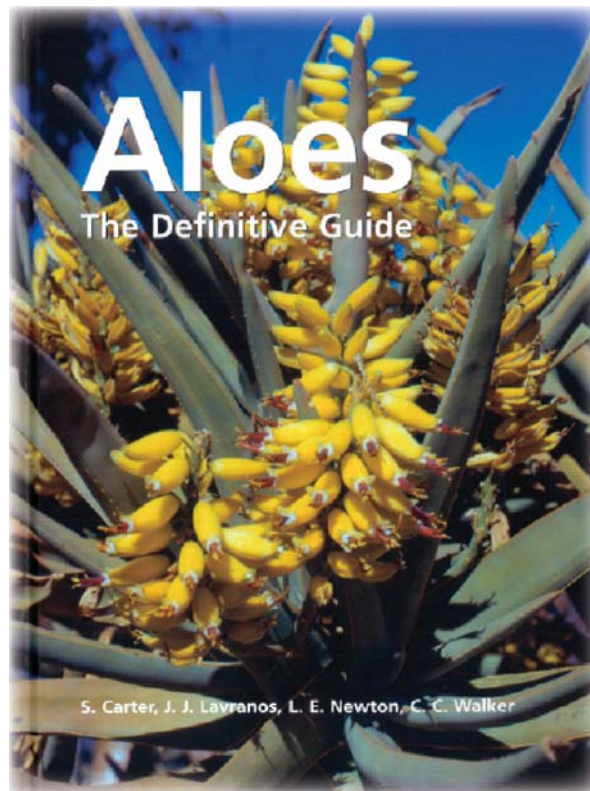
A key to the group and extensive keys within the groups to the species use vegetative characteristics as much as possible. I tried using them on two unknown aloes in my garden but was unsuccessful in identifying them. I'll try again using a centimeter tape measure when they are back in bloom.

The bulk of the book, over 600 pages, is given over to species with a full page for each species that gives the current name only, first published data, descriptive characteristics, location and affinity species and their differences. Two to four color photos accompany each species, mostly in habitat. A one page simple glossary, botanic term illustrations and an extensive bibliography round out the book.

I would like to see range maps, scientific botanic illustrations and synonymous species names to place

an old name with the current one such as Anderson did in The Cactus Family. But all this would have added to the size and cost. Buy the book anyway. It's still a delight and practical too.

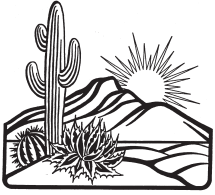
